Leaders should establish partnerships to foster leadership skills needed by youth as they prepare to deal with environmental concerns.

There are many opportunities for collaboration. For example, county Extension educators can support school initiatives by:

- ✓ Providing resources or materials
- ✓ Training teachers or volunteers
- ✓ Providing teen leadership training
- ✓ Assisting with in-class activities, simulations, or field trips
- ✓ Helping plan an event, such as a festival
- ✓ Facilitating data analysis
- ✓ Helping students use the computer
- ✓ Assisting with the development of an outdoor school site
- ✓ Linking to after school programs
- ✓ Serving as mentors for teen activities
